The Club welcomes back all members who have renewed their memberships for another year and in keeping up with compliance with all the rules and regulations of a vintage car club, please be reminded that Rule 6 has been added to the Club Rules that specifies those members who have registered this club as their Primary club for the purpose of RMS Conditional Registration on the Historical Vehicle Scheme (HVS) must have their vehicles inspected by the club's inspector once a year for substantial modifications. This stands even if a Safety Inspection Report (pink slip) has been obtained. If the Club inspector finds any substantial modifications to the vehicle, an engineer's report may be required. Secondly, the vehicles must take part in at least one organized club run per calendar year.

Quite a few numbers of cars now are on the log book system and we urge members to be diligent in logging in before the start of the journey to avoid being caught out with substantial fines. Through CMC and from our members, there have been numerous examples cited at our general meetings of heavy fines imposed on non-complying log book users.

A big thank you to all those members who have continued to support the club. We now have 67 paid members, even though there have been a few retiring members due to health issues. With enough support from other volunteered members, the club is continuing to operate properly and efficiently.

Robert Byrne is now our club representative for the CMC, and the club also expressed its gratitude to Russell Linfoot for his service for the last few years on the role. Our website is now being managed by Kevin Lewis and a huge progress has been made to transition from the previous website. There are also numerous interesting articles in our Club Facebook.

I encourage all club members to participate in the car runs if possible, I must say we have had some fantastic runs through the countryside of NSW, meeting interesting people and places and enjoying the fresh air! The President's weekend will be in NSW country region in October and why not come along and take the Austins for a great run.

Again, huge thanks to all the committee members for their contribution to the club.

Single membership: \$50; Family membership: \$55; Joining fee: \$30


The joining fee applies to all new members and those who have not renewed their membership by 31st January each year.

CARnivale – Australia Day 26th January 2019

The fourth CARnivale in Parramatta Park promised to be a 'scorcher' and it wasn't far wrong!

In spite of the dire weather predictions we found a place under the trees to keep out of the sun and a gentle breeze kept us cool throughout the day. The result was another most enjoyable day amongst friends. But it was not wise to spend too long in the sun looking at cars!

Five Austin 7s joined around 250 other pre-1988 Classic cars being displayed in the Park outside Government House, together with an excellent display of fire engines from the Museum of Fire in Penrith and a number of Veteran cars from the turn of the last century. Numbers were down, but it was not clear whether people avoided the heat, or there were fewer entrants.

Club members attending were Kevin and Barbara Fahey in their 1937 Ruby, Trevor Hails in his 1932 Deluxe Saloon, Anthony Harte in his 1929 Meteor, Kevin Harte in his 1929 Roadster and Brian and Deirdre Haywood in their 1933 Deluxe Box Saloon, 'Annie'. Tom Harte brought up the rear in his 1982 Mazda RX7. Unfortunately, Eric and Ann Bourne were not able to join us this year, but we did catch up with John and Robin Ikin and Craig Davies.

This year the arrangements for the assembly convoy were different and all the Austins had registered under the Vintage Vehicle Club banner so that we could all park together. We met up at Bunnings car park in Westmead and entered the Park through the Queens Road entrance and were sent directly to the show area. The Rotary breakfast had been set up at the top of the show area, so we were able to have breakfast at leisure as soon as we were parked and had chosen our base under the shade of the trees. Much easier than previous years.

The Australia Day festivities and attractions in the Park were the same as last year. Hot Air Balloons, an extensive area with stalls offering a large selection of food and from many ethnic origins, the open-air stage with a continuous programme of activities and music through till the fireworks at 9pm and a large fun fare with rides for the kids.

This year the display of Fire Engines from the Museum of Fire was in front of Government House which made it easy to access and enjoy. The Museum of Applied Arts and Sciences (MAAS), or the Power House Museum in Castle Hill had brought a restored Chummy which was on display in front of their tent.

The agreement between Sydney Council and Parramatta Council was for three years, but it seems unlikely that the event will return to the City. Parramatta Council now regard the display as an integral part of their Australia Day celebrations and will be determined for it to remain so, but the survey sent to all participants allows comment to the organisers each year. We will have to wait and see if there is a push to go back into Macquarie Street when the light rail eventually starts to operate.



A bit of history

Opened in March 19, 1932, the Sydney Harbour bridge was a major construction of its kind linking Milsons Point to Circular Quay. Everyone had to pay the toll and it was paid off in 1988 and cost more than 70 million. At the time, there were even elephants crossing the bridge! The toll collectors had a hard time standing on unguarded plinth and in the first 24 hours the bridge's 25 collectors collected \$1500 pounds from 30,000 cars. It is hard to imagine that in 1933, 3.9 million cars crossed the bridge and in 1938 it was 6.8 million. In 2018, about 200 trains, 160,000 vehicles a day (equivalent to 58,400,000 per year), crossed the bridge, on top of that 3000 pedestrians and 1900 cyclists also crossed the bridge every day.

In comparison, the Austin 7 was produced from 1922 to 1939 in the United Kingdom by Austin. In the first year of production, nearly 2,500 cars were made and by 1939, 290,000 cars and vans had been made. The Austin 7 was also licensed and copied by companies all over the world and the very first BMW car, the BMW Dixi was a licensed Austin 7, same with the original American Austins.



Many of our club members have been associated with the Austin 7 and various clubs for a fairly long time. Can you pick a current member from this photo?

He took part in the Park Orchards Trial on 10 August 1953 and came second place out of 14 competitors with 885 points (the first scored 915 pts) and the last scored 88 points. The trial ends with very muddy competitors and spectators. What fun they had!
